Latrobe Presbyterian Church is blessed with a magnificent building, professional staff, and active program. With an average worship attendance of 150, we are easily in the top 20% in size of congregations in our Synod of Pennsylvania

> and West Virginia. (Comparing active membership numbers, at 508, we are larger than 90% of the Presbyterian Churches in these states.)

> While an informal and ad hoc giving plan may work for smaller churches, we are simply too large to run by the seat of our pants and an informal network of folks who will give when asked. Folks who have joined Latrobe Presbyterian Church have chosen to be at a larger church with all its blessings and responsibilities.

Pledging is not required of members!

No, there is no law forcing church members to support their church.

We don't work that way. The church exists only by common consent of its members. We have chosen to have a Presbyterian church here in Latrobe, seeking to be not an empty shell but a leader in mission, a beacon in reformed worship, and a center for religious learning and spiritual growth. Praise God! We get to support our choice with our treasure.
