It seems being Presbyterian these days means being the butt of *Saturday Night Live* jokes, as well as making the headlines in the Beacon Journal and elsewhere. So much for media grace.

Not mentioned in the story are some of the good things about being a Presbyterian these days.

The gender-sensitive "policy paper" referred to I know nothing about. But I do know about the gender-dominant language of the Bible, written in a time when women had few, if any, rights, let alone careers or voting rights.

What is wrong with allowing churches the option of using more neutral language during prayer, if an individual congregation wants to?
